



2018 Election: Key Races to Watch

As of November 2, 2018

I. KEY BALLOT QUESTIONS

Below is a list of interesting ballot questions being put to voters that could affect the energy and transportation sectors. These ballot measures are being watched closely at the state level, particularly by energy industry advocates, environmentalists and local policymakers.

Carbon Taxes

Washington State Initiative 1631 - Enacts a carbon emissions fee (or "carbon tax") of \$15 per metric ton of carbon, beginning on January 1, 2020. The fee will increase by \$2 annually until the state's greenhouse gas reduction goals are met. Revenue is dedicated to help low-income individuals transition to renewable energy, improve the efficiency of buildings, expand electric vehicles, and a long list of other special programs and projects. A similar initiative on the 2016 ballot was defeated by 59%.

Fuel Taxes

California Proposition 9 - Repeals last year's gasoline and diesel fuel tax increases of 12 and 20 cents per gallon, respectively, and repeals the increase to annual vehicle registration fees.

Missouri Proposition D - Increases state motor fuel taxes by 10 cents, to 27 cents per gallon by 2022.

Utah Question 1 (Nonbinding) - Asks voters if they support a tax increase on motor fuels of 10 cents per gallon to fund local road construction and maintenance.

Washington State Advisory Vote 19 - Asks voters whether to maintain or repeal the state's one-cent-per-barrel oil spill tax on crude oil and petroleum products received through a pipeline.

Marijuana Legalization

Michigan Proposal 1 - Legalizes the commercial sale and recreational use of marijuana. Revenue from a 10% tax on marijuana sales is dedicated to the repair and maintenance of roads and bridges (35%), improvements to public schools (35%), and local governments with marijuana businesses (30%).

Missouri Amendment 2 - Amends the State Constitution to legalize marijuana for medical use. It includes a 4% sales tax, with revenue dedicated to veterans' services.

Missouri Amendment 3 - Amends the State Constitution to legalize marijuana for medical use. It includes a 15% sales tax, with revenue dedicated to the development of treatments for cancers and other diseases.

Missouri Proposition C - Changes the state law to legalize marijuana for medical use and creates a 2% sales tax to help fund veterans' services and drug treatment, education, and law enforcement programs.

North Dakota Measure 3 - Legalizes recreational use of marijuana and creates an automatic expungement process for individuals with convictions for a controlled substance that has been legalized.

Oklahoma Question 788 - Legalizes marijuana for medical use. This question was put to voters in a special ballot on June 26, 2018 and was approved by 57%.

Utah Proposition 2 - Legalizes marijuana for medical use.

Minimum Wage

Arkansas Issue 5 - Increases the state minimum wage from \$8.50 to \$11.00 per hour by 2021.

Missouri Proposition B - Increases the minimum wage from \$7.85 to \$12.00 in 2023, and indexes the state's minimum wage to inflation thereafter.

Utilities & Renewable Electricity

Arizona Proposition 127 - Amends the State Constitution to require that a certain percentage of the state's electricity be generated from renewable sources, starting with 12% in 2020 and increasing to 50% in 2030.

California Proposition 70 - Amends the State Constitution to require a one-time two-thirds vote in each chamber of the legislature in 2024 or thereafter to pass a spending plan for revenue from the state's cap-and-trade program for greenhouse gases. This question was included on the June 5, 2018 ballot and defeated by 63%.

Nevada Question 3 - Amends the State Constitution to require the legislature to pass laws establishing "an open, competitive retail electric energy market," prohibit electrical-generation monopolies, and protect "against service disconnections and unfair practices." It also declares a right to choose one's own electricity provider.

Nevada Question 6 - Amends the State Constitution to require that 50% of the state's electricity come from renewable resources by 2030.

Other Issues of Interest

Florida Amendment 9 - Bans offshore oil and gas drilling beneath all state waters.

II. GOVERNORS & STATE LEGISLATURES

Republicans have complete control, including governorships and both houses of the legislature, in 26 state governments. Democrats have complete control in eight states, including Connecticut, Delaware, New Jersey and Rhode Island. The 2018 election is likely to see some state legislatures flip and provide opportunities for both parties to consolidate control. This will help to decide the fate high-profile state and local issues including carbon tax proposals, gasoline and diesel fuel tax increases, truck tolling, electrification initiatives, marijuana legalization, minimum wage laws and other issues.

1. Governors

Republicans are defending 26 of 36 gubernatorial seats this November. Democrats are defending nine seats, and there is one independent, Gov. Bill Walker of Alaska. Below is a list of key governor's races in the Northeast. Note: Governor Phil Murphy (D) of New Jersey is not on the ballot this election.

2. State Legislatures

According to an analysis by FiveThirtyEight.com, there are more than 6,000 seats up for election across 87 state legislative chambers in the U.S. this election. Of these, 16 currently have divided governments, including Maine, Massachusetts, New York and Pennsylvania. Major parties hold razor-thin majorities in several states, raising the stakes for the 2018 election. These states include Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire and New York.

It is believed that Democrats will try to push-through state carbon taxes and initiatives to electrify the transportation and space heating markets in the coming years. This could become much easier if they obtain complete control in states like New York and Vermont, and greater control in other legislatures throughout the Northeast. Below is a list of *current* party control in each legislative chamber in the region, not including vacancies (TP=Third Party).

*Note: The Connecticut Senate's current tie is broken by the Lieutenant Governor, a Democrat. The New York Senate is Republican-controlled because one Democrat, Simcha Felder, caucuses with the Republicans.

III. U.S. House of Representatives

All 435 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives are on the ballot this year. Republicans have enjoyed a sizable majority in the House since the 2010 election and prior to current vacancies they've held 241 seats. At least 218 seats are needed for a majority in that chamber. Therefore, Democrats need a net-gain of 23 seats to obtain the majority. *The Cook Report* rates 48 House seats as "Toss-up or Worse," 45 of which are Republican-held. Another 65 districts are rated competitive ("likely or "lean"), 55 of which are Republican-held. More than two-dozen Republican-held districts voted for Obama or Clinton - these districts alone could win Democrats the majority. Computer modeling by FiveThirtyEight currently sees around an 85% chance that Democrats will win control. Below are key races in the Northeast that may help decide the fate of the House of Representatives.

IV. U.S. Senate

Democrats are defending 24 of the 33 Senate seats on the ballot this year. To retake the majority, they must flip two of nine Republican-held seats, many of which are in traditionally red states. All the while, Democrats are defending some extremely competitive seats. This includes Senate seats in 10 states won by President Trump in 2016. There is also an unexpectedly competitive race in deep-blue New Jersey, where Democratic incumbent Robert Menendez is struggling due to ethics concerns.

Polling was favorable towards Democrats over the summer, likely due in part to the President's then-sagging poll numbers and the strength of Democratic incumbents this election cycle. Since then polls have inched towards the GOP, driven mainly by Democrats' handling of the Kavanaugh nomination. Not only should Republicans keep the Senate, but they could even pick up a seat or two. GOP leaders see this as key if control of the House flips. It would also provide a "cushion" heading into the 2020 election and its more Democrat-favored map. Democrats are of course hoping for a record turnout and a "blue tsunami" that would carry them to victory and complete control of Congress. *FiveThirtyEight's* current election forecast only gives them about a 15% chance, however. Key Senate races from around the country that you should watch on election night include:

Arizona (Open Seat) **Pure Toss-up**

This seat is being vacated by retiring Republican Senator Jeff Flake. Two popular sitting U.S. Representatives Martha McSally (R) and Kyrsten Sinema (D) face-off for this highly contested seat.

Florida

Incumbent Senator Bill Nelsen (D) vs. Governor Rick Scott (R), who's moderate tone and handling of recent hurricanes have boosted his popularity. Mississippi

This Senate race is unlikely to be resolved on Election Day due to its "run-off" law. Incumbent Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith, a gubernatorial appointee to replace retiring Senator Thad Cochran (R), will face three challengers on election day: State Senator Chris McDaniel (R), former U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy (D), and independent candidate Tobey Bartee. If no candidate gains 50% of votes, a runoff will be held between the top two candidates on November 27, 2018 (this is almost certain to happen). Democrats are hoping the split Republican vote will provide a pick-up opportunity. If control of the Senate remains undecided after Election Day, this run-off election will attract unprecedented national attention, not to mention money.
